From the Manse

Dear Friends

"I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong."

I referred to these words on Sunday, 29th May when I paid tribute to Her Majesty the Queen because they capture something of a commitment to service that has spanned in excess of the 70 years we have been recently celebrating.

All of us not only have commitments which take up our time on a daily basis. We also make specific commitments at certain points in our lives - from work commitments when we take on particular roles through to family to our spouses and our children. There are particular times in our journey of faith when we are called, inspired even, to make a commitment to God and to his people both far and near. It is indeed a commitment to somehow respond to the commitment God has made to us in so many ways but, in particular, in the form of his son Jesus Christ. We call this commitment worship and worship is more than a commitment we make at a particular moment in time or when we have time for it or, even, when we remember

Worship is all encompassing in that it is about the whole of our lives and the whole of our journey through life which makes "belonging" to the church locally, globally and universally much more than belonging to any other group or club we belong to. Our journey through Holy Week is a reminder of that commitment of God who not only has given us the very breath of life in us but, has also given us what we need to sustain us on our journeys, through good times and bad. Pentecost, which this year we celebrate at the beginning of June was that recommitment of God when, as promised by Christ, he sent the Holy Spirit in the world to be both a comfort when life is hard and an inspiration when we find it more and more difficult to sustain the commitment that all of us made when we became part of the family of the church.

The Kirk Session is currently reflecting on what it means to be the church as we re-evaluate our role as a church in this community where God has set us down. This reflection we hope and pray will lead to a re-commitment of all of God's people and the harvesting (bringing together) of all of our gifts for the greater good that we might not only "make disciples" but also seek ways to continue to "nurture one another in faith".

Edinburgh Direct Aid (EDA)

Ladies from the New Wellwynd and other churches have for several years kindly supported EDA by knitting lovely baby and children's clothing and blankets. These items are transported by EDA in container ships to the Lebanon then onward to the town of Arsal, which is located close to the Syrian border. More than 100,000 refugees exist there in more than 17 tented camps which are located at an elevation of 5,000 feet. As you would imagine, these high and exposed locations suffer from extreme weather, heavy winter snows (temperatures dropping to -15C), followed by flooding creating substantial health risks for the refugees, approximately half of whom are children. A high proportion of the refugees also have special needs. In 2019, the Lebanese Government decided to demolish the refugee huts which were built with hollow bricks on the grounds they did not have building permits. The bulldozers took no account of possessions destroying beds and mattresses, kitchen appliances, furniture, etc...

Since then, the humanitarian situation at Arsal has greatly deteriorated as, according to the Lebanese Government only simple tents are now allowed for Syrian residents.

The near collapse of the Lebanese currency due to runaway inflation together with regular increases in the cost of heating oil has exacerbated the situation with the United Nations Refugee Agency annually providing 200 litres of fuel per family even though the average family requires 700 litres. It is almost certain that the most vulnerable will die.

Could you possibly assist the humanitarian efforts by knitting warm woollen clothing for babies and young children?

I would be pleased to either collect knitted items at Sunday services or alternatively please contact me on 01236 761246 when I shall be pleased to collect from your home.

For your additional information I advise that EDA have in recent times placed a limited number of experienced volunteers in the Ukraine, delivering food, water, medicines, and ferrying refugees to bus and rail stations.



The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee is celebrating Her Majesty's 70 years of service.

There have been many organised events and fun street parties celebrating the Platinum Jubilee across the United Kingdom and the world.

Queen Elizabeth II was born on the 21st April 1926. She was crowned Queen on the 2nd June 1953 and is the longest reigning monarch ever in Britain.

The Queen lives mostly in her private quarters in Buckingham Palace in central London. Her Majesty has a total of seven official residences throughout the United Kingdom, including Windsor Castle.

Her favourite dogs are corgis and she has a passion for horses.



The Crown Jewels of the United Kingdom, are a collection of royal ceremonial objects held in the Tower of London.


The Imperial State Crown is 31.4 cm tall and weighs 1.06 kg (2.3 lbs).

Its frame is made of gold, silver and platinum and decorated with 2,868 diamonds, 273 pearls, 17 sapphires, 11 emeralds and 5 rubies.

The royal orb symbolises the earth and is a traditional symbol of monarchical power.

It was created for the coronation of Charles II in 1661 and is made of gold, sapphires, rubies, emeralds, amethyst, diamonds, pearls and enamel.

The orb weighs 1.32 kg (3 lbs).




