From the Manse

Dear Friends

Pete McCarthy in his book, "The Road to McCarthy", paints a vivid picture of a breathtakingly beautiful Romanesque cathedral at Cashal in Northern Ireland. Its fame goes back to the twelfth century when it is said that St Patrick preached there using the shamrock as a metaphor for the Trinity. On that same spot a chapel was built and then a cathedral. The story continued many, many years later when the stunning cathedral was abandoned and a new one built at a different spot. The reason for this was very simple, the then Archbishop was unable to make a grand entrance. Because of its unique position he could not be driven by his coach and four horses right to the door and, instead, had to walk part of the way. The solution was to find somewhere flatter to suit him and his horses. A cathedral built, not to the glory of God, but the glory of one man.

Looking back in history we can recount many times when the church has been built up to offer security and benefits to individuals, rather than the glory of God. The Prince Bishops in County Durham built up Durham Cathedral not only to the glory of God, but also as a fortress to protect them and their interests. But is that what the church is all about? When building up a church, and I don't mean bricks and mortar, but a church as in the body of Christ in a place or a community we need to ask why are we building and to what end. In these difficult days of looking at the dwindling number of members and ministers we can look at the situation in different ways. We can lament the decline of the church, sit back and do nothing. Or, we can see it as an opportunity to reflect on, not only of where we have been, but also, where we are going.

During the last difficult few months with my health it has been an opportunity to reflect anew on a lot in my life and what I have discovered is that it is strengthened my faith in God with me and reaffirmed the power of the Body of Christ in your love, thoughts, prayers and encouragement.

We are in the business, not of empire building where we hold onto positions and traditions that have no bearing or relevance today, but of kingdom building where the values are so very different. They are values borne out of a focus on God as we seek to honour him in worship, our work and our witness. They are also borne out of a desire to do the right thing by our neighbour.

He faithfully attended worship and got a lot from it as he also put a lot into church - on the Board and as an elder. He faithfully attended meetings and would invariably have something to say. He faithfully attended to his district as he looked out for them but that is the kind of man that he was - interested in others . . . interested in you . . . keen to help and support in whatever way he could. He would get his sleeves rolled up when there were work parties and work to be done.

Offerings

At its meeting on 5th September, the Congregational Board received a short report on the income and expenditure during this year to date. Offerings are the key financial measure for us, allowing us to meet our commitments to support ministry locally and nationally, as well as our own mission and maintenance obligations. Comparisons of income over time are difficult because of the Covid-19 pandemic which curtailed our buildings-based activities for part of the period. Having said that, at £86,578, our offerings from the start of this year to 31 August were slightly above the same period last year and thanks go to all those members who have continued to support New Wellwynd through their offerings. While, at this level we are able to meet all our recurring commitments, in comparison to our pre pandemic position, income is significantly lower, which is a longer term concern

Around 80% of our offerings comes from members who have set up a bank standing order in favour of the Church. There are many advantages from this, including the convenience of being able to support the Church even if you are unable to attend worship each week. We will shortly be making arrangements for offering envelopes for next year for those who do not have a standing order—if you would like to give by standing order, please speak to either David Walker or me.

For those who pay income tax, completing a Gift Aid declaration, is a welcome way to supplement the value of your offering, without committing to giving a particular amount. If you have not completed a declaration but would like to know more, again please speak to David Walker or me.


