From the Manse

Dear Friends

Over the years there have been many situations, particularly tragic and challenging ones, I have had to walk into and embrace unsure of what I am going to find. In these I have experienced every conceivable emotion as individuals and families have grappled with unimaginable loss in the most tragic of circumstances. These have included situations where the lives of loved ones have been taken by others. There has been that deep sense of loss and all of the questions and allied emotions that go along with it. I have also seen such strength and courage in the most awful of circumstances. For them it has truly been a "rollercoaster of emotions", a phrase you will have heard me use from time to time.

When we look at the Easter story and all that led up to it we see a rollercoaster ride with the ups and the downs of the last few days of Jesus' life. Those who went to the tomb to attend the body of their Lord there would have been the dread of the journey as we, at times, dread what we know is going to be a difficult journey. They expected to find the life-less body of the one they had followed and must have been bracing themselves for that but, instead, found an empty tomb. Surprise by what they saw, they were also taken aback. They were perhaps baffled and confused with so many questions running around in their heads to add to those already there! It was truly a rollercoaster of emotions and who says that the Bible has nothing to say to us today? It has so much to say to us, especially this story which is at the very heart of our faith.

When we understand Easter in the context of present tragedy and the low points we experience in life we can see how when embracing our cross we find that in reaching the depths the only way is up - through the darkness and beyond the difficulties. This is what Easter hope is and the assurance that the resurrection offers to us - strength for today and brought hope for tomorrow.

As we walk with Christ, retracing his footsteps through Holy Week, we are reminded of him walking with us. As we wait with Christ on Good Friday we are reminded of him waiting with us and holding us in the darkest of days. As we journey with the women to the tomb we start to see the glimmer of light in our darkness as the risen Christ comes to us and says "peace be with you".

The journeys hard but the hope is real as is the peace that faith in Christ offers to each and every one of us. It is a message of hope that the church needs to hear and needs to share in a broken and weary world.


On the Third Day

The tale of the intrepid pilgrims continues.

Sunday, 24th July

It's 6am and yes it's **DING DANG DONG!** The bells are ringing loud and clear to welcome in the Sabbath! After a rather coldish shower, I was now well and truly awake and all ready for morning prayers. Whilst waiting for pilgrims to arrive in the library, the bells once again sounded. I thought it was Boab having a laugh and calling everyone to prayer! However, not even he could manage 78 repetitive dongs! Our theme this morning was friendship and fellowship and our text was Psalm 121. Helen from Glasgow provided some nice music for a time of personal thought and reflection. Thought for the day: "An open heart is an open mind!" (Courtesy of the Dali Lama!) After our now customary hearty breakfast we were all set for a day of exploration in and around Imst! Our first adventure was to be met by a local guide at our hotel to embark on a walking tour of the town. First stop was the church with the loud bell just behind the hotel - Pfarrkirche! Fulfilling the Prophecy

Throughout the Old Testament, God promised His people that a Messiah was coming to change life as they knew it. Jews in the time of Jesus believed that this Saviour would save them from the oppression they were experiencing from the Romans and other hostile nations. God told the Israelites that specific signs and attributes would characterise the one that He would send. God is mysterious, but He wants people to know Him. He wants you to be able to recognise what He is doing. Jesus Christ had to fulfil every Old Testament prophecy regarding the coming Messiah. There were many, but He fulfilled them all. One of these prophecies said, "Therefore my heart is glad and my tongue rejoices; my body also will rest secure, because You will not abandon me to the realm of the dead, nor will You let Your faithful one see decay" (Psalm 16:9-10,). The Messiah would see death, but His body would not decay. because He would rise again. This was fulfilled when Jesus rose from the dead and showed Himself to His followers. He had only the marks on his hands and feet and the wound in His side as a mark of His death. 



THE EMPTY TOMB
