#### From the Manse

Dear Friends

I am not long back from the General Assembly where I have been a commissioner. I usually go with a spring in my step, looking forward to the reports, discussions and catch ups but, this time, I wasn't so enthusiastic. There is much to concern us in the Kirk when we look at the statistics. There is much to trouble us when we hear stories of tensions within congregations and between them because of the prospect of a forward plan that will drastically reduce buildings bringing in light of the financial situation and the falling number of ministers. Yet, I came back encouraged because of what I saw and heard and experienced in stories of what the Kirk is doing and what people are doing. I came back encouraged because I am aware of the gifts of the people of God here at The New Wellwynd and the, as yet, untapped potential of many of you.

The church down through the generations has faced various crises and has responded with reformation - changes that have taken its people back to basics time after time because a crisis, as well as being a real lion to difficult times, can also be an opportunity to do something new and exciting. We are reacting to changing times and changing fortunes. We are also getting back to basics, which is, as a church made for mission - reaching out in Christ's name and in his love.

We have entered the Season of Pentecost when we reflect on what it means to be the church - a church open to God and his Spirit and open to each other in and through the work of that same Spirit. This is an openness to where God can lead us, how he can use us and, together, how lives can be changed as our lives are changed by the reality of God in Christ, who continues to make all things new.

A commissioner used the analogy of a song from "Oliver", "Reviewing the Situation". We do need to review but any review needs to lead to reform, a real change in our outlook (our thinking) and our moving out (our words being matched with action).

I have always believed in the potential of congregations such as our own, which is why next session we will be looking at how we can encourage a greater involvement in the worship, work and witness that make us who we are to bring us together and then send us out to be the powerful and loving people God has created us to be and called us to be.

I, the Lord of sea and sky, I have heard my people cry.
All who dwell in dark and sin my hand will save.
I who made the stars of night, I will make their darkness bright.
Who will bear my light to them? Whom shall I send?
Here I am, Lord. Is it I, Lord?

The tale of the intrepid pilgrims continues.

Tuesday, 26th July .....

DING! DANG! DONG! Yes, its 6am and so begins our penultimate day in Austria! Freda led our morning prayers in the library, where the theme was based on God being the solid rock, the foundation upon which we can depend and build our lives. Our reading was from Micah 4: 1-4. Surrounded by mountains it was quite appropriate! Our thought for the day was 'Make sure you stand firm on the solid rock!' After breakfast, we boarded our coach to head along the Inn valley to the Tyrolean capital, Innsbruck, with the now usual geography lesson en-route! Once there, we enjoyed a guided tour of this delightful city. We walked through the Imperial Gardens passing the State Theatre and Imperial Court Church, entering the old town bedside the courtyard of the Imperial Palace. Within the old town we saw the famous Golden Roof and Helblinghaus and I was scolded by the guide for not paying attention! (Too busy taking pictures – honest!) Eventually, after escaping the clutches of our guides we had a couple of hours to do our own thing. Many stayed within the confines of the old town itself finding a nice spot, a café, to enjoy a coffee, a sip of beer or wine and simply watch the world go by! Later in the afternoon, we continued on our day's adventure to the Cistercian Monastery of Stams. Here we had a guided tour of its magnificent Abbey. The high altar, situated at the far end of the church is where you find the most famous piece of art in the abbey. It represents the baroque tradition of putting a Tree of Life beyond the altar and was made in the 17th century. There are 84 gilded figurines harmonically arranged on a sky blue backdrop 19 metres tall, with a large Madonna in the centre and scenes from the lives of Christ and Mary on top. Among the other impressive attractions were the delicately painted ceiling frescos and stuccowork, as well as the wooden choir stalls, the ancient organ and the Tomb of Princes. After the customary visit to the gift shop, it was all aboard for our return to Imst. Once back at the hotel we had time to rest our weary legs before dinner (our last supper!) As usual, the more adventurous went for a swim although one young lady had to rescue her bathing costume beforehand, which had somehow, blown off her balcony onto a nearby roof!

We later enjoyed a lovely last night meal together before retiring into the bar for some late night refreshments. The rest they say is history! Night night!

# Fruit of the Spirit
