From the Manse

Dear Friends

After Church this morning, I carried out a couple of home visits, followed by a visit to a member in Wishaw General. I found myself in Adult Critical Care where I was a year ago after surgery. I said that to the nurse and she remembered. She commented that they see folk at their worst but never get to see them having got through the difficult times and it was encouraging for her to see me. It doesn't seem like a year and this time last year when I was unsure about my immediate future, never mind what lay ahead for me and for the congregation. This was all on the same day, to say that on 21st October, I will be stepping down as minister at The New Wellwynd Parish Church to take up a new post as the Clerk to the Presbytery of Clyde. I did it with a heavy heart, having been your minister for some 22 years!

Alistair Begg, a Scottish minister in the States, in his book "Made for His Pleasure" quoted the late Rev Eric Alexander of Glasgow Tron when he was exploring vocation: "There is no ideal place to serve God except the place where He has set you down". Eric was a dear friend of my Uncle Alex and was always a gracious and godly man. I truly believe that God set me down in this place 22 years ago, where I have known the privilege of serving you as your minister. As I said on Sunday morning, we have cried together and laughed together. We have grown and taken risks together. This has been the greatest ministry any minister could have asked for: partners in the gospel and friends along the way.

I have always tried to ensure that I have been in the place where God has wanted me to be and been open to him working in and through my ministry. God has been nudging me elsewhere in recent times which was difficult to face up to and difficult to have to share on Sunday. Hard as it is I do believe that God has a plan for The New Wellwynd which involves quite a different future in partnership with St Columba's and Jackson. God has a plan for me as he is leading me in quite a different direction.

For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you a hope and a future.' Jeremiah 29: 11

As recent times have taught me and this morning has reminded all of us, we do not know what lies ahead or what plans God has for any one of us. What we do know is that he travels with us, he leads us and he enables us to be the people he has created us to be and the followers he has called us to be.

I do not know what lies ahead the way I cannot see yet one stands near to be my guide he'll show the way to me.

There are 3 kinds of Pastors who work as a Team each Friday and Saturday night.

- 1. As a **Street Pastor** we walk the city centre, liaising with police, street aid and other agencies. Our role is to listen, care and help anyone who needs our assistance during the hours of 10pm to 4am. This involves considerable walking.
- 2. **Safe Zone Pastors** who give support to anyone brought into the Safe Zone, some medical knowledge could help, but caring once again is the main part of our role.
- 3. **Prayer Pastors** work from home, giving a covering of prayers to the city throughout our shift and to be available to prayer requests from street pastors.

Training is provided for all the above prior to being commissioned. I am happy to answer any questions about GSP and would welcome anyone interested to join me on an Observation evening whenever I go on shift for part of or a full night's duty. Some of the group headed down into the centre of Imst to have a wander through the shops, drink coffee and eat cake! I do believe one or two also sampled some local beverages. Me, I jumped on the toy train along the valley to Nassereith that I had missed out on a few days previously, when I went hiking up the Rosengarten Gorge. I was accompanied by a few others, some travelling on the train for a second time. It was a rickety and bumpy journey along the floor of the Gurgltal valley but the stunning mountain vistas on either side were well worth the discomfort! By early afternoon, it was all aboard, as we loaded the coach and said goodbye to Imst. Journeying back to Munich Airport we followed the scenic route along what is called the 'Romantic Road' through the south western part of Bavaria, stopping for a couple of hours in the medieval town of Landsberg am Lech, complete with its castle and cathedral. Many pilgrims spent their time exploring the shops and sampling some local delicacies like sausages and fries! The ice cream was very nice! For the history buffs the town is noted for its prison where Adolf Hitler was incarcerated in 1924. It was during this incarceration that he wrote his book Mein Kampf together with Rudolf Hess. After the Second World War it was the place of execution for more than 150 war criminals. Despite a grizzly period of time in its recent history it had a lovely historical centre with pleasant riverside walks. For one last time, it was time to count heads onto the coach as we departed for the airport. Unlike our outward journey, we had a direct flight back to Edinburgh, where we said farewell to a number of our fellow pilgrims. As midnight approached the New Wellwynders and friends were heading back along the motorway to Airdrie, where family members were waiting to take everyone home! Phew it's all over! Looking back over the course of the week, I think everyone enjoyed themselves. The Passion Play the sights, the sounds, the aromas, the activities and perhaps most important of all, the friendships. Together, we laughed, we cried and shared with each other our own stories (many of which cannot be printed!) We created many happy memories which will remain with us forever. I still here DING! DANG! His followers were to be a good influence on others and try to get other people to do the right thing.


He wanted people to share with others out of love for them.


"Do not judge others", he told them. "And don't worry about things. God will take care of you." (This story can be found in Matthew chapters 5, 6, and 7.)
