Dear Friends

I have lost count of how many pastoral letters I've written over 28 years of ministry and 22 years as your friend and minister here in Airdrie. Sometimes the words and themes have come easily. This time being the last letter I will write to you, it is difficult to know where to start, because how can I even begin to express my deep gratitude for the past 22 years of ministry and ministries.

Like many of the October letters this one has been written on the coach returning from the Airdrie Academy Belgium trip, which as always, has been well received by students and staff alike. For me, it has been a great privilege to have led worship on this trip as it has been a privilege and pleasure to lead worship in The New Wellwynd. Senior Circle




land, while others brought moisture from the ocean far inland, some even brought a heavy blanket of snow to protect the plants and seeds in winter.
