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Message from Lilly

Dear Friends,

As I sit here writing, next Wednesday will be All Saints Day. Further, tomorrow my son Fraser will set off to Frankfurt to run in the marathon taking place there. This got me thinking back to 10 years ago, when, for my sixtieth birthday, I ran my first marathon in Berlin. What an experience it was with over thirty seven thousand runners taking part.

It may surprise you but the beginning and the end of a marathon is not the hard part. The hard part is the bit between. Starting is easy. for the adrenalin is pumping and the excitement is building. In the same way when you see the finish line come into view it gives you such a sense of elation, such joy that your spirits lift along with your feet and carry you on to completion. No, starting and finishing are not the difficult bit - it's the bit between that causes the problem - for there's miles and miles of road in front of you and around the twenty mile mark you hit the wall! The point when a runner's glycogen (stored energy within the muscles) runs out. This forces you to slow down, sometimes to a walk and makes you doubt that you'll ever be able to finish what you've started. You just want to give up and go home. Aware of this, one of the Berlin Marathon sponsors set up a Motivation Wall at the twenty one and a half mile mark. This was a huge screen on which family and friends could post a personal video message to you which you could read as you ran past. For it's a wellknown fact that the right word at this time can make all the difference and prevent you from losing heart or becoming discouraged. I didn't have a motivational message. But what did lift me were the folk running along with me and the spectators along the course. At one point I heard a young female voice shouting, "Lilly!" She'd read the name on my bib. I turned in the direction of her voice and she gave me a huge smile and shouted, "You're doing great.... You can make it.... Just keep going!"

Likewise, Fraser tells how when he hit the wall his feet felt like blocks of lead, when there in front of him, at a corner in the road, was a big group of really good looking girls who started shouting encouragement to him. "I kicked it up a notch and started running like an Olympian!" he said. "They were really good looking!"

When the going gets tough there's always the temptation to give up. But knowing there is folk rooting for you, feeling the love and support of those around you, knowing that you're part of something bigger than yourself, that you're not alone, that others have ran the race before you and completed the course, that is what really lifts you up and stops you from losing heart or getting discouraged. That is what helps you run on steadfastly towards the finishing line. This is true not only for the marathon runner. It is also true for the person of faith.

Farewell to Robbie and Carol

On Sunday, 8th October 2023 we said farewell to Robbie and Carol after 22 years of dedicated service to our Church. The following is an extract of the address given by Gibby Cox.

2001. Harry Potter was the number one film. Bob the Builder was the number one hit song. The World Trade Center was attacked. And the Hamilton's arrived in Arthur Avenue. That latter point may not be part of world history, but I can assure you it will remain fixed as an important time in New Wellwynd history.

If we, the Congregation, thought that we were in for a quiet settling in period – surprise! Because immediately things began to change. Members of the Congregation started taking part in services, doing readings and prayers. Children's addresses became one of the highlights of a Sunday morning, with children learning so much. Many will always remember being able to make a clootie dumpling in a microwave, as Robbie demonstrated one morning. Then there was Pepper the hand puppet – didn't everybody love him? We had races up and down the aisles, we had quizzes and of course the annual holiday club. The children were enthusiastic, understanding that there was a place for them in the church. Children loved you, Robbie.

Other improvements were implemented. Kirk Session meetings were scheduled with a published agenda and Board and Session membership increased so quickly that someone claimed that Robbie was giving away Green Shield stamps. There was an exciting buzz about the place. To me, another sign of Robbie's success was the number of students and others that were placed under his tutelage. Members will remember names like Gavin Black, Jim Murphy, Beverley Stevenson, Maxine Buck, Laura Digan, John Carswell, Ronnie MacKinnon, and Eckhart Bosch.

Chaplaincy was another focus. At Airdrie Academy the chaplaincy was split three ways – I think you will guess who embraced this – with trips to the War Graves being a highlight. Robbie returned from his last trip to Belgium with the pupils only two weeks ago. Alongside the Academy, Robbie had chaplaincy with Rochsolloch and Victoria schools, as well as supporting Mavisbank. Such an inspiration to young people!

From schools, Robbie decided to turn his attention to what might be termed his community side, soon becoming chairman of Airdrie Burns Club, board member at Airdrie Savings Bank and board member of Airdrie Citizens Advice Bureau. Being politically astute, it was no surprise to see Robbie at Friday's snack bar with local and sometimes national politicians. I recall at least one, maybe two occasions, a cabinet minister with his security guard was present, having a snack, with Jean complaining that they never paid. During Robbie's spare time, we have seen our Church refurbished, with new carpeting throughout, re-upholstered choir chairs to match


