Message from Bill

Dear Friends,

I write this as my first month with you draws to a close, and I really do need to start by thanking everyone for both the warm welcome I have received from you, and for the help and support I have also received. We enter now a new church year, with the season of Advent. It is a time when we sit quietly and wait patiently to celebrate Christ's birth. Okay, maybe it isn't always as quiet or as restful as that! For many of us it is a season of mad preparations, whether that is shopping for presents or for food, for wrapping presents, for writing cards, for visiting and being visited, for going to the pantomime or to concerts, or for cooking. Phew! That is quite a list. If that applies to you, it is especially important that you take time just to relax, unwind, and think of the reason for the season. Set aside a little time each day to spend in prayer, read a chapter of your bible, sit and contemplate what God did for us through Jesus.

We plan to hold an Advent Bible Study on the Wednesday evenings 6, 13, and 20 December. That will be in the hall at 7:30pm. And yes, that will include prayer and bible reading, but hopefully also some rest and peace as we think together of the truth of God's word. Please do come along to that if you can, even if it is only to sit quietly and catch breath for an hour. Rest is important – see Genesis chapter 2 – and I hope that we can include some rest in the time we spend together.

At this time of year we also remember people who find Christmas difficult, for a variety of reasons. People who are alone, perhaps through death or maybe through circumstance. There are people who struggle financially, who feel pressured into spending money they can ill-afford to spend. Some families are split up, perhaps through work, perhaps through illness, perhaps through imprisonment. Some people simply struggle with the darkness of long winter nights. Jesus spent time with anyone who was finding life difficult, and these are the people that we, too, must try to support.

The Christmas story contains many elements. The one I invite you to consider this year is saying "Yes" to God. God does not force Himself on anyone, we all have a choice. Mary had a choice.


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


The Story of Jesus' Birth
