Message from the Vestry:

Dear Friends,

As I mentioned in the last magazine, my wife and I were blessed with glorious sunshine in the month of May as we explored Scotland's North Coast 500. Back to School!

The school summer holidays are very quickly fading into the past as a new session gets under way. I well remember those days as a teacher returning after the summer break refreshed and up for the challenges that lay ahead! As a young teacher (a long time ago!) you would volunteer for many things and that included taking a Religious Education (RE) class or two! Believe me, they were challenging but nonetheless both enjoyable and rewarding. Although you had a curriculum or syllabus of sorts very seldom did you stick to it, I just went with the flow. Perhaps it was a survival technique! Anyway, whether it was a new fresh First Year or Fourth Year class full of very opinionated worthies you always got asked the same question, "Sir, what is the meaning of life?" I would reply, "That is a very good question, now let me explain!" Ten months later when I had finished (only one period per week) they wished they had never asked the question! But it gave me free scoot to deliver my programme! Back in the eighties, Christianity and the Teaching of Jesus was a central part of most schemes of work. Today, pupils learn about other World Religions and talk more deeply about moral and philosophical issues within an ever changing society and global community and quite rightly so. It was certainly less complicated back in the day! Talking of which, another question I was often asked, when I got started, "Sir, What is the Kingdom of God?" Again, I would reply enthusiastically, "What an excellent question!" You could hear sighs and a lot of heads would drop, as I went off at a tangent (Maths teacher remember!) However, that question is every bit as relevant today, as it was away back then. In Mark's Gospel Jesus talks about the Kingdom of God, but what does he mean?

The Kingdom of God could be described as follows: (From an old lesson plan)

- a society where God rules
- a place where death is overcome
- a place where diseases are cured
- a place where evil spirits are overcome
- a place where people find a home and shelter in difficult times

Its characteristics and values could be as follows:

- faith
- simplicity of a child/purity
- belongs to those who suffer
- love God and love your neighbour
- honesty/truth
- humility
- joy in others' achievements
- wealth and ambition must be sacrificed

The coming of the Kingdom of God (Mark 1: 14-15)

Here, Jesus says: "The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!"

He meant that God's rule has come. As his ministry progressed Jesus taught his followers more about what this meant for their lives. Then the hands would go up with deeper more challenging questions that even a school Chaplain would struggle to answer! Alas, some divine intervention – the bell!

So there you have it, the first lesson of a new term – only nine months to go!








Jesus tells a story.....



Jesus taught people many things by telling them stories. These stories were called parables. A parable is like an earthly story with a heavenly meaning. It is also a story that uses typical, everyday situations in order to teach important truths.

One day, He told a large crowd this parable. "A man went out to sow some seed. As he sowed it, some of the seed fell on a dry path. Birds came and ate the seed. Some seed fell on a rocky path. Not much earth covered the stones. The seed started to grow right away because it was not deep in the ground. But, when the sun began to shine, it was too hot for the new plants. They died because they had no roots. Some seed fell among weeds and thorns. The weeds grew up and made the new plants die. But some seed fell on good ground. The seed grew and the plants gave more seed. Some plants gave thirty seeds. Some gave sixty. And some gave a hundred and more."



Later that day, Jesus told his disciples what the story meant.

"People listen to the message about the kingdom of heaven. If anyone does not understand it, the devil comes along and takes the message out of their heart. That person is like the seed which fell on the dry path. The birds ate the seed before it could grow. In the same way the devil takes the word of God from our hearts before it can grow.

The seed that fell on the rocky path is like the person who hears the message and right away they are glad to hear it.

However, it does not go down deep in their heart and they only believe it for a short time. The rocks kept the seeds from having roots so they died. In the same way hard times cause people to give up on God.

The seed that fell among the weeds and thorns is like the person who hears the message, but thinks more about material things to make them happy. These things push the message out of their hearts. No good comes from it. The weeds and thorns choked the plants so they died. In the same way worry and desiring other things can choke our love for God.

The seed that fell on good ground is like the person who hears the message and understands it. Much good comes from it. The seed is able to grow as the good ground is well taken care of. In the same way we need to take care of our hearts so the word of God can grow in us.

When Jesus told the parable of the sower he used the story to explain that even though he preached or spread the Word of God everyone's reaction would be different.
