"The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us."



Christmas in the Trenches - The Christmas Truce!

It was December 25, 1914, only 5 months into World War I. German, British, and French soldiers, already sick and tired of the senseless killing, disobeyed their superiors and fraternised with "the enemy" along various parts of the Western Front (a crime punishable by death in times of war). German troops held Christmas trees up out of the trenches with signs, "Merry Christmas". Thousands of troops streamed across a no-man's land strewn with rotting corpses. They sang Christmas carols, exchanged photographs of loved ones back home, shared rations and even played football. Soldiers embraced men they had been trying to kill a few short hours before. Some soldiers used this short-lived ceasefire for a more sombre task: the retrieval of the bodies of fellow friends who had fallen within the no-man's land between the lines. The so-called Christmas

Truce of 1914 was one of the last examples of the outdated notion of chivalry between enemies in warfare. It was never repeated—future attempts at holiday ceasefires were quashed by officers with threats of disciplinary action. Nevertheless, it served as heartening proof, however brief, that beneath the brutal clash of weapons, the soldiers essential humanity endured.

The following poem/song was written by a chap called John McCutcheon. It is based on the events outlined above from the front lines of World War 1. Ian Calhoun, a Scot, was the commanding officer of the British forces in one of the areas involved. He was subsequently court-martialed for 'consorting with the enemy' and sentenced to death. Only King George V spared him from that fate.

My name is Francis Toliver, I come from Liverpool
Two years ago the war was waiting,
for me after school.

To Belgium and to Flanders, to Germany to here
I fought for King and country,
the country I love dear.

'Twas Christmas in the trenches,
where the frost so bitter hung
The frozen fields of France were still,
no Christmas song was sung.
Our families back in Britain
were toasting us that day
Their brave and glorious lads,
in a land so far away.

I was lying with my messmate
on the cold and rocky ground
When across the lines of battle,
came a most peculiar sound.
Says I, "Now listen up, me boys!
each soldier strained to hear
As one young German voice sang out,
through the air so clear.

"He's singing bloody well, you know!"
my partner says to me
Soon, one by one, each German voice
joined in harmony.
The cannons rested silent,
the gas clouds rolled no more
As Christmas brought us respite,
from this awful bloody war.

As soon as they were finished
and a reverent pause was spent
"God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen"
struck up some lads from Kent.
The next they sang was "Stille Nacht,"
"Tis 'Silent Night,'" says I
And in two tongues one song filled up,
the still and cold night sky.

"There's someone coming towards us!"
the front line sentry cried

All sights were fixed on one lone figure,
trudging from their side.
His truce flag, like a Christmas star,
shone on that plain so bright
As he bravely strode unarmed,
into the night.

Then one by one on either side,
walked into No Man's Land
With neither gun nor bayonet
we met there, hand to hand.
We shared some secret brandy
and wished each other well,
And in a flare lit soccer game,
we gave 'em hell.

We traded chocolates, cigarettes,
and photographs from home.
These sons and fathers far away,
from families of their own.
Young Sanders played his squeezebox
and they had a violin
This curious and unlikely,
band of men.

Soon daylight stole upon us
and France was France once more
With sad farewells we each began
to settle back to war.
But the question haunted every heart
that lived that wondrous night
"Whose family have I fixed,
within my sights?"

'Twas Christmas in the trenches
where the frost so bitter hung
The frozen fields of France were warmed
as songs of peace were sung.
For the walls they'd kept between us,
to exact the work of war
Had been crumbled and were gone,
gone forevermore.

As we approach Christmas 2018 let's hope that songs of peace continue to be sung around our world, particularly in those areas where conflict exists. To all of our lads and lassies wherever they may be, who are serving and striving to bring peace and who are helping and supporting others, we wish them a safe, happy and blessed Christmas.

Streaming of Services

Live streaming of our Morning Service started on Sunday 2nd December 2018 – Advent 1.

This is a new service offered to our housebound members or anyone who may not be able to attend Morning Service.

On our website, www.newwellwynd.org.uk, there will be a link “Watch Live” which you can click to take you to the LIVE page where people can watch our service. You could if you wish, save this as one of your favourites.

The streaming of the service will start around 5 minutes before the service begins, so if you try and access the LIVE webpage, you may see an error message. You should either go back or refresh the web page.

If you wish to see the picture in full screen mode, there is an icon at the top right hand side of the viewing screen which will enlarge the picture to the full size of your device's screen.

As part of the Sanctuary project last year, there were 3 cameras installed which will enable us to transmit the service. These cameras will primarily be positioned towards the Chancel area, Lectern etc., but will pan the Congregation at times during the services. There will also be pre-set positions for certain services.

If you, as a member or visitor to the congregation do not wish to be seen during morning worship, then, we have a designated area where we would ask you to sit as the cameras will not pan to that area.

The Designated Area is under the Gallery on the Pulpit side of the church.
