Dear Friends,

One of the Sunday readings recently was the account of Jacob “wrestling” with God. On that occasion we considered what this was all about and I reflected on the connection between three areas of potential conflict in our lives - physical, emotional (mental) and spiritual. Different problems and difficulties can affect us in so many ways but these three areas are not separate, they are connected. As we look after our bodies we must also strive to look after our emotional/ mental health and well as our spiritual life.

In preparation to do 72 miles of the Camino de Santiago next October I am realising more and more the interconnectedness of the three and the importance of preparing, not just my body physically with visits to the gym and walking, but also my mind as I focus on the challenge and spiritually as I prepare for a pilgrimage.

Preparation for anything, especially something new, is paramount to the success of whatever we are taking on. Advent is not only the build up to Christmas, it is also the beginning of a new church year. How we prepare for that new year, a time of new beginnings, and for Christmas is so important because for many it can be a time of “wrestling”. This can vary from the physical preparations and the busyness which can exhaust us through to emotions running high when we are missing someone who is no longer with us and the many pressures bearing on us.

Sunday by Sunday in Advent we will be journeying through different themes helping us to prepare spiritually, in our faith life, to welcome Christ anew into our lives. When we do that and we find a peace in all of the madness going on around us we can know that peace permeating every part of our being, affecting how we feel within ourselves and how we feel about what is happening in the world.

By the time Christmas comes we will entered a new chapter in the life of our nation following the General Election. Wherever we stand and whatever we believe that spiritual focus helps to ground us in our Sovereign God who in his son has assured us that he is the same “yesterday, today and forever.” In all of the changing scenes of life, the physical and emotional traumas, it is good to know who we can trust in, the one who made promises, never reneged on them but brought them to life in Jesus.

May the Lord Jesus, light of the world,

born in David’s city of Bethlehem,  
born like him to be a king:  
be born in our hearts at Christmas,  
be King of our lives today and forever.

### **Two Babies in the Manger**

In 1994, two Americans answered an invitation from the Russian Department of Education to teach morals and ethics (based on biblical principles) in public schools. They were invited to teach at prisons, businesses, the fire and police departments and a large orphanage. About 100 boys and girls who had been abandoned, abused, and left in the care of a government-run programme were in the orphanage. They relate the following story in their own words:

It was nearing the holiday season, 1994, time for our orphans to hear, for the first time, the traditional story of Christmas. We told them about Mary and Joseph arriving in Bethlehem. Finding no room in the inn, the couple went to a stable, where the baby Jesus was born and placed in a manger. Throughout the story, the children and orphanage staff sat in amazement as they listened. Some sat on the edges of their stools, trying to grasp every word. Completing the story, we gave the children three small pieces of cardboard to make a crude manger. Each child was given a small paper square, cut from yellow napkins I had brought with me. No coloured paper was available in the city. Following instructions, the children tore the paper and carefully laid strips in the manger for straw. Small squares of flannel (cut from a worn-out nightgown an American lady was throwing away as she left Russia), were used for the baby's blanket. A doll-like baby was cut from tan felt we had brought from the United States. The orphans were busy assembling their manger as I walked among them to see if they needed any help. All went well until I got to one table where little Misha sat. He looked to be about 6-years-old and had finished his project. As I looked at the little boy's manger, I was startled to see not one, but two babies in the manger. Quickly, I called for the translator to ask the lad why there were two babies in the manger. Crossing his arms in front of him and looking at this completed manger scene, the child began to repeat the story very seriously. For such a young boy, who had only heard the Christmas story once, he related the happenings accurately until he came to the part where Mary put the baby Jesus in the manger. Then Misha started to ad-lib. He made up his own ending to the story as he said:

"And when Mary laid the baby in the manger, Jesus looked at me and asked me if I had a place to stay. I told him I have no mamma and I have no papa, so I don't have any place to stay. Then Jesus told me I could stay with Him. But I told him I couldn't, because I didn't have a gift to give Him like everybody else did." "But I wanted to stay with Jesus so much, so I thought about what I had that maybe I could use for a gift. I thought maybe if I kept Him warm, that would be a good gift." So I asked Jesus, "If I keep you warm, will that be a good enough gift?" And Jesus told me, 'If you keep me

warm that will be the best gift anybody ever gave me." So I got into the manger, and then Jesus looked at me and He told me I could stay with Him for always. As little Misha finished his story, his eyes brimmed full of tears that splashed down his little cheeks. Putting his hand over his face, his head dropped to the table and his shoulders shook as he sobbed and sobbed. The little orphan had found someone who would never abandon nor abuse him, someone who would stay with him for always.

And the Americans? They had learned the lesson they had come there to teach that it is not what you have in your life, but who you have in your life that really counts. We all should give thanks for the people that "keep us"- in life - and for all of God's many blessings to us: freedom from want, life, love, togetherness, and for the enduring love of Jesus Christ, the one person who keeps us warm and safe for always. Have a lovely Christmas and best wishes for the New Year ahead.
