Dear Friends,

My attention was first drawn to Ronda in Andalusia by Michael Portillo when he stopped there on his rail journey through Spain. My abiding memory of his visit to this picturesque Andalucian town was of the bridge built over the spectacular yet rugged gorge below. I wasn't to be disappointed by my visit there last year as all of my expectations of the place were to be more fulfilled. The place was unforgettable as was the journey, but for quite different reasons.

When in Spain, I always hire a little car and this visit was no different. I made my way up the winding road to Ronda but the journey was hampered by a flat tyre - a sudden blow out! I waited by the roadside for assistance, having failed miserably to work out how to locate and retrieve the space saver tyre. Help came, I managed to limp into Ronda at no more than 80km per hour. Everyone was so helpful and the tyre was repaired for the princely sum of 9 Euros.

So, why am I telling you this? Plans are made. Dreams are caught. Reality on the other hand has a way of turning out in ways we could never have expected when things go pear shaped, or imagined when they have surpassed all expectations. We can make plans and be disappointed, thwarted at every turn. We can make plans and be pleasantly surprised. What is important in all of our plans and journeys is to know and be comforted by the knowing that we don't need to journey on our own or languish in problems on our own. I was in a foreign land, with a limited knowledge of the language, yet I was helped by others. When we get a true perspective on things, we realise that there is more good than bad. There are more helpful people than not, pleasant people who bend over backwards for us. People who, when life and others let us down, never ever do.

The stole I wear for funeral services, gifted to me by a member of the congregation, has bright pictures I can use to bring alive Scripture when children are present. Two images are of the sun and the stars, a reminder of Psalm 121 - "the sun will not harm you by day, nor the moon by night.". God is not distant like the hills or even like those who have promised to be with us and let us down. God is at our very right hand and, in the words of George McLeod, is "closer than breathing itself". This latter statement is so wondrously powerful because you cannot get anything closer to us than breathing, and this image of God is of him, in and through his Spirit, as the very breath of life around us when experiences and situations are in danger of sapping the life out of us.

"Strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow" is what that relationship with God in Jesus assures us of - the reality of God with us here and now, as well as the promise of that constant presence in the journey ahead. May God bless you and keep you close to himself now and forever.
