from the Manse -

Dear Friends,

Genki Kawamura has a thoroughly thought provoking series of experiences with the Devil in his highly acclaimed book "If Cats Disappeared From The World". A young man's days are numbered and given the opportunity of adding days to his life - one day for each thing he removes, not only from his life, but also from the world. It's a bit like Ko-Ko's little list in "The Mikado" except it's what will never be missed but what the character would really miss in his life. Quite a challenging thought.

I wonder what we'd have on our list or even our bucket list, what we could live without and what we couldn't live without. Kawamura's novel reminds me a bit of those Tom and Jerry cartoons when the devil is on one shoulder and an angel on the othertwo quite different voices calling us to make choices for good or ill. Be it choices about what is important and unimportant in our lives, about the directions our lives are going, about priorities along the way, we are all too often pulled in different directions. I believe that Lent is a time to take stock in life, especially about our faith and how strong or even, how important it is in the big things and the big decisions but also in the every day routine of life.

Right at the start of Lent, we often think about Jesus being tested in the desert when the Devil sits on his shoulder, yet he is guided not by what he hears or finds there, but what is in his heart and engraved in his mind, the very Word of God. No matter our view on the Devil, there is no doubt in my mind that as Jesus had choices to make, influenced by self or by the guiding hand of God, these choices were there, and uppermost on his mind up until the moment of crucifixion where and when he was tested by the call that if he was the very Son of God, he'd come down from the cross.

Although we have choices to make on a regular basis, Lent is a time to consider how much we are prepared to be guided by self, or by the world or by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God. There are many others on a Sunday morning at worship, Sunday night at our Lenten Cafe Church or even at home as you follow the Lenten study book, which a number of the congregation are following at this time. For this you might be able to create a spiritual bucket list, filled with so much we shouldn't and cannot miss, like a regular time to hear the word, digest it and act upon it, a list of


what we can do to deepen our relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ and each other, a list of what we might do to bring something positive from our faith into the life of the world.

Lent is traditionally seen as a time to give up something and it is right that we make sacrifices, but only to make way for what it is good and wholesome, when it comes to the faith.

OUR STUDENT, BEVERLEY, SAYS:

As a very young girl, I wanted to work in the post office, I liked the idea of stamping with an ink pad, that never happened. When, as a family, we left Glasgow to move to a wee cottage in Greengairs, I was 13 years old and, of course, still at school. This was the time I stopped attending Church, however, I was involved with the Girls Brigade for a couple of years. When I was 15, I left school and started working as a clerk with Scottish Farmers Dairies in Cumbernauld . . . I married at 19, emigrated to South Africa for a couple of years and worked as a credit controller. Then back to Scotland working as a wages clerk. I had my first daughter at 23 and this was when I returned to Church (being invited to by my Mum at the Toddler Group). A second daughter at 27 and shortly afterwards joined New Monkland Church on the same day as my daughters were baptised. After being a stay-at-home Mum doing several part-time jobs, I started working again as an Auditor part-time when my youngest was 3 and in nursery, and later within the same company as their Admin. Supervisor.

Fast forward to 1992, moved to Callander. Fast forward again, moved to Bellshill. I was ordained as an elder in Calder Parish Church in Coatbridge. It was there that I sensed God's call into a different type of ministry and it's this call, as Ordained Local Minister, that I am working towards. I retired early leaving a managerial role. It's been a long journey so far with University modules, discernment placement, assessments, and conferences to attend. Having said all that: I can say it's not been easy, but

Having said all that: I can say it's not been easy, but I am learning so much and enjoying it so much that the 4 years have passed quickly. I have been made very welcome at all of my placements and it's clear to see God's hand in many of the good works that are being done across our Presbytery and throughout Scotland.

I know that this may sound cheesy, but the folk at New Wellwynd have made me feel "at home" and I thank you all for that.

All going well, I will be moving again to complete my training (a year's probationary placement) later this year.

Can I urge anyone who may be sensing that God is calling them, to talk to your minister and friend, Robbie, as I am sure he will be happy to help you to decide either way. Or, if it's not for you, then why not invite someone to join you in Church one Sunday - that may be all they need to be able to walk through those church doors again. BEVERLEY

Help for Persecuted Christians in Syria

It is now 8 years since the start of the war in Syria. Today there is still ongoing conflict among many different factions. During this time, the persecution of Christians has meant that many have suffered the trauma of being displaced around the world. Those who have remained in Syria continue to experience horrendous persecution and hardship. Almost every Christian family still living in Syria is suffering from some form of trauma. Depression, anxiety, fear and a sense of hopelessness cloud people's everyday lives. The Bible Society in Syria is working to address this desperate situation by training more Syrian Christians in Bible-based Trauma Healing. Working in local churches, these trained facilitators will reach out to families to meet their particular need.

This is an effective programme which is bringing peace and healing. It helps people survive spiritually and to come through the many traumatic things they have seen and experienced. Many people of other faiths are deciding to become followers of Jesus, and demand for Bibles in Syria has never been higher.
