
but allowing it to be spoken in a language that the world will understand and in a way that allows people to demonstrate that God is very much alive and at work in our lives as well as in the life of the world.

Approaching Death and Dying Seminar - Saturday, 12th May at 10 am in New Wellwynd

(Professor D. Robin Taylor will speak about getting beyond the taboo and navigating the challenges of ill health at the end of life.)

For nearly 100 years, death and dying have been a taboo topic. Modern medicine emphasises that we should try to fix all of the people all of the time,

but eventually mortality is the winner. This often means that we are ill-prepared for the experience of the challenges of critical illness towards the end of life. There are tensions and contradictions for patients as well as their families. Spiritual as well as medical issues are often problematic. Professor Taylor has returned to Edinburgh after working as Professor of

Respiratory Medicine in New Zealand for over 25 years where he was also minister of a suburban Baptist congregation for 8 years. He has also served in ministry in the Church of Scotland. Now working at Wishaw General Hospital he has been commissioned by NHS Lanarkshire to improve the care of patients in acute hospitals who are at the end of life. He has produced an acclaimed documentary 'A Good Death'. He is uniquely placed to share his thoughts on coping with crises at the end of life. In this event, these questions are explored for 45 minutes and then opened up for discussion.
