from the Manse -

Dear Friends,

The War Memorial at Irvine Cross bears the names of 353 soldiers and civilians who lost their lives during two world wars. In my early years of ministry in Irvine I led the town's Act of Remembrance at least twice which, as it is here when I am called to do it, a great privilege. Experiences down through the years, especially the visits to war graves in Europe, have added to that sense of privilege in doing what I have been able to do as well as a sense of great responsibility to be true to the memory of those who have gone before us. As I stood at that War Memorial, either to lead the service or stand with my colleagues as one of them led the service, there was a secret waiting to be discovered there.

This year I will take my place as officiating minister at Airdrie's War Memorial assisted by Sister Catherine from the Hospice. From the very first time I have led a service such as the one I will lead there to the services I will lead there, at church and in school, I have never lost any sense of the significance of it or the power to move me. But this year it will be more poignant for me because of something I discovered just by chance. I have always known that my great-grandfather Andrew Hamilton had died young and that the grandfather my own father knew was a step grandfather, his Gran marrying for a second time as a widow. What I didn't know and, most of the family didn't know, was that she was a war widow and my greatgrandfather died on 12th July, 1915 at Gallipoli. If only knew in those early years what I know now!

Whether we have a known connection with any of the wars or not there is something poignant for all of us. In remembering we are in no way glorifying or even glamorising war but giving ourselves, those around us and those who have the power to send armies in or pull them out, a poignant reminder of the terrors of war and challenge to see that as others have died to secure our peace how can we live to both maintain peace and actively live it and share it in our lives.

John McCray the Canadian medic gave us a challenge in his poem "Flanders Fields" -

To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.

Will we take up this challenge, a challenge brought to life in Moina Michael's reply -

Oh! you who sleep in Flanders Fields, Sleep sweet - to rise anew! We caught the torch you threw And holding high, we keep the Faith With All who died.

In all of this may we be channels of God's love, peace and amazing grace that, as they transform our lives in our Lord Jesus Christ, they might transform the life of the world.

SCOTTISH POPPY APPEAL 2019

Poppyscotland provides life-changing support to our Armed Forces community. They reach out to those who have served, those still serving, and their families at times of crisis and need by offering vital, practical advice, assistance and funding. Thev believe that those who serve or have served, whether regular or reserve, are deserving of support to live life fully without disadvantage after service. No veteran should live without the prospect of employment, good health and a home, and we all have a part to play in achieving this. Poppyscotland is best known for running the iconic Scottish Poppy Appeal which raises over £2 million each year. This, combined with other year-round fundraising, enables them to provide tailored support and funding to thousands of ex-Servicemen and Women as well as other vital services in advice, employment, mobility, respite, housing and mental health support. Last year they raised more than £3.6 million in voluntary income, and spent in excess of £3 million on charitable activities. To put that into

context, they must raise more than £10,000 a day to continue their work. They pride themselves as being as transparent as possible and take very seriously the huge trust the Scottish public place in them when they make a donation. They welcome any questions or suggestions over how to use the funds that are entrusted to them. They are also fully committed to making sure the vital services that the Armed Forces community urgently need are provided as efficiently and effectively as possible. UNFORGOTTEN FORCES

A consortium of organisations, which includes Poppyscotland, has been awarded £4 million from the Aged Veterans Fund to undertake a three-year programme of support for older veterans over the age of 65 and their families in Scotland. Unforgotten Forces is a partnership between 16 leading organisations which will deliver a range of new services and enhancements in areas including advice, access to healthcare, social isolation, respite, along with creative activities and events for those in care settings. The consortium has been awarded the funding to undertake this ambitious programme of work. Poppyscotland is the lead partner and, in addition to coordinating the consortium, the funding will enable Poppyscotland to offer more of our popular and hugely beneficial Poppy Breaks to older veterans. The application for funding was made to the HM Treasury grant-giving body funded from Libor banking fines. The money will be used over the next three years to improve the coordination of existing provision and introduce new services aimed at supporting older veterans. The portfolio will include services such as advice provision, support for those on the NHS pathway with transport being provided to appointments. Loneliness and isolation will be tackled through befriending, respite breaks and a newly created day centre. **Roving Reporter**

Heroines of the First World War

Flora Sandes

Born and raised in Yorkshire, Flora Sandes was the only British woman to serve on the frontline in WW1 - fighting for the Serbian army. Sandes, who died in 1956, volunteered for the St John Ambulance when she was 38-years-old and travelled to Serbia, where she enrolled in their army.

The reported tomboy was promoted to the rank of Sergeant-Major but was severely wounded by a grenade in 1916. She later received the King George Star by the Serbian government and is still a Serbian national hero.

Elsie Inglis

Elsie was a qualified surgeon and supporter of the women's suffragette campaign. After the outbreak of the First World War, she offered her services to the Royal Army Medical Corps in 1914 but was told to 'go home and sit still'. Undeterred, Elsie set up her own organisation, the Scottish Women's Hospitals, which treated troops in Serbia and Russia. She became the first woman to be awarded the Order of the White Eagle, the highest honour given by Serbia.

Elizabeth Knocker and Mairi Chisolm

Elizabeth ('Elsie') and Mairi set up their own First Aid Post close to the Belgian frontline at Pervyse in November 1914. Elsie, a trained nurse, believed that lives could be saved if wounded soldiers were treated close to the front line. The two women put their own safety at risk to save lives - they often worked under fire and left Pervyse only after being badly gassed in 1918. Both were awarded the Belgian Order of Leopold in 1915 and the British Military Medal in 1917 for their bravery.

Katherine Furse

Katharine joined the Voluntary Aid Detachment in 1909. On the outbreak of the First World War, Katharine was chosen to be the head of the first VAD unit to be sent out to France, arriving on 21 September 1914. In 1917, she became the Director of the newly formed Women's Royal Naval Service. As well as three service medals, Katharine was awarded the GBE and became a Dame. After the First World War, she became the Director of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.
