This can be taken as a focus on both the church community and the family of the church, and the community in which the church finds itself and is called to serve as a witness to Jesus Christ.

For the church community here at The New Wellwynd to continue to develop and reach its full potential what is needed is a full investment of the time, talents and money by all its members seen in your involvement in the worship, work and witness as well as in the fostering of friendships and the building up of relationships. This is an area we need to continue to explore and develop together as the whole people of God.

We are a community and we are a family. We belong to each other as we belong to the body of Christ. In the time that lies ahead as we need to look at building up our community and building bridges in the community within which we live. All of us need to consider the part we have to play and all that we can freely give to ensure the continuation of the advancement of Christ's Kingdom in this

place. This prayer is a reminder that being a Christian and being called by Christ into the fellowship is not a spectator sport, but that it is going on a journey when we are actively engaged in the full life of Christ and his Church.

The John Muir Way!

Over the past 19 months it would be fair to say I have done a fair bit of walking both near and far! Traversing both east and west across the country with my pal Boab, we have walked many parts of the John Muir Way which is a walking/cycling route that runs for 134 miles from Helensburgh in the west to Dunbar in the east! My feet can testify to that! But that aside,

I came across an article recently by a lady called Holly Rossi which resonated quite a bit with me, making me view the naturalist John Muir in a completely different light!

Holly writes......The naturalist John Muir wrote, "Everybody needs beauty as well as bread, places to play in and pray in, where nature may heal and give strength to body and soul." As the leaves start to change colours and float to the ground in all their crunchy, russet majesty, Muir's words are on my mind. The beauty of nature during autumn is both glorious and fleeting. I love the idea that there's strength to be found in both.

Muir asks us to both "play" and "pray" in nature, to recognize both the sacredness of natural cycles and seasons and the joys of comparing leaf colours, and even leaping into piles we've raked up through our less-than-playful hard work.

His words are a call to find balance in our lives. In Muir's formulation, we don't need to choose between play and prayer, or between beauty and bread. We need all these things, balanced in relationship with each other, to fulfil our bodies and souls—to find healing and strength.

This autumn, we had hoped to feel renewed and refreshed, in a post-pandemic moment of return and resilience. The reality has turned out to be quite a bit more complicated than that. Muir's words offer subtle context—"nature *may* heal," he writes. Then again, for survivors of natural disasters and the ongoing pandemic, nature may also challenge us deeply and painfully.

How we navigate this complex reality is, in my view, where the <u>true strength and healing emerge</u>. May we each find moments of joyful play and prayerful reflection, moments when we can rediscover the beauty we need to nourish ourselves, body and soul.

...... I don't think anyone would disagree with that!

SITUATIONS VACANT

Over the past year or so we have been developing our work in the use of PowerPoint and digital media both for the in person congregation and those watching online. This is an area that we would like to develop and harness the skills of a wider number of people in the congregation and so, we need help with sound, camera work and PowerPoint.

Sound: On a Sunday there is a Rota of individuals who control the sound coming through the speakers in the Kirk and out to those watching from their houses and homes. Is this something that you think you could learn or, if you know something of it already, develop?

Cameras: There are now three webcams in the sanctuary and these are controlled by volunteers Sunday by Sunday and at other times. Those controlling the cameras are also controlling what is streamed live. Again, is this something you've dabbled in and would like to learn more? Is it a new challenge you'd like to take up?

PowerPoint: Currently the minister controls the PowerPoint which is what you see on the big screen on a Sunday and on your screens at home - all of the words and videos. It would be good to have a Rota of people willing to take control of that on a Sunday. You wouldn't need to know your way around PowerPoint but would only need to be ready to learn how to move the slides on a Sunday and deal with any trouble shooting.
