Hello from Iraq! — August 2017

It's been a minute since I last sat down to write one of these emails...or perhaps more than a minute...I'm two weddings, two baby announcements, two holidays and a Mosul liberation down. I've had a busy two months with travelling home, back to Iraq, to Lisbon and back to Iraq again, but I've had so much fun. Meanwhile, in my absence, the story in Iraq has kept moving and Tearfund's response kept going. Let me catch you up......We've just had our quarterly Iraq Senior Management meeting where everyone comes together to look at what we've achieved and plan what comes next. I got to listen to progress updates from our field bases explaining the work they are doing to provide cash, water sanitation and hygiene, clothing and shelter assistance. They each only have about 30 staff and how they do what they do blows my mind! I spoke on the bigger picture security context. With the offensive in Talafar due to start by next month, elections coming up and militias moving to former IS territory, I'm going to have plenty to keep me busy! We then set out strategic objectives for the next six months - our main focus will be establishing a base in Mosul city and preparing for the flow of people likely to flee Hawija in the next six months.

In my first update, I asked you all to pray for the liberation of west Mosul. Well, a month ago Mosul was declared completely liberated and the humanitarian response is well underway. Aid workers are working around the clock and last week I got to meet a particularly inspiring one whose story I just couldn't believe...he works in a Mosul field hospital but, while back in the US, found out he had brain cancer and had to begin radiotherapy. When this didn't clear the cancer doctors suggested chemo to extend his life for another few years. He de-

cided he wanted the treatment but also that he wanted to spend his last years doing something that mattered. This man is now back working in the Mosul field hospital and does his chemo on his lunch break. I can't imagine the strength and determination it must take to do what he is doing. I'd love if you could all pray for this brave, selfless man. Please pray for his strength, his healing and thank God for such an incredible heart.

I just want to say thanks for all your prayers and well wishes over the last few months. This month, I'd love if you'd continue to pray for the Mosul response, there's still a lot to be done. Pray that the city will stabilise and the army/militias will continue to allow humanitarian access. Pray that Tearfund is able to get the permissions, registration and people it needs to setup a Mosul base.

Oh, and one last praise report, you know the multi-million dollar US AID proposal I asked you to pray for...we got it!!

SANCTUARY RENOVATION

In early September we successfully completed the first phase of the renovation programme in the sanctuary. This involved the complete re-wiring of all the downstairs electric bar heaters (and replacement of those broken), installation of new heating radiators in the gallery and vestibule, and minor alterations to the layout of the chancel with the inclusion of new heaters there. We were appreciative way in which the contractors worked with sensitivity to the nature of the building.

During October, we are intending to begin the next phase of the renovation. There are three parts to this phase, although some works will be undertaken consecutively. The first part is the renewal of the wiring for the lighting and the replacement of the lights dating from 1968 with modern technology. The second part is the installation of audio visual facilities and some modification to sound arrangements. The final part is re-plastering (there are a lot of cracks) and painting. We will also be renewing the downstairs carpet and replacing a number of pew cushions in the gallery. The sanctuary will continue in use for Sunday worship as normal during the renovation, although some areas may have restricted access at different times depending on the progress of the works. The sanctuary will also be available for funerals.

The overall objective of the renovation is to enhance the sanctuary, without making significant alterations to its layout or appearance, ensure that it is fit for the next generation of use and allow for greater opportunities for community use. The audio visual equipment will also allow us to introduce use of visual materials in support of worship, while offering the possibility of wider distribution of worship services through the internet.

The renovation programme is being funded from our own funds and with generous support from Patersons Quarries Limited via the Scottish Landfill Communities Fund.
