The Coronavirus Diaries

The Coronavirus Diaries have been a regular feature in the Life and Work Magazine over the past few months. It has been both heartbreaking and heartwarming to read many of the stories from our Church of Scotland partners around the globe. This is one from Kenya, where The Rev Peter Kaniah Kariuki, Secretary General of the Presbyterian Church of East Africa, tells how the church has fed more than 30,000 families during the lockdown.

Caring for one another in Christ

On March 15, the Kenyan government confirmed the first cases of COVID-19 and announced a nationwide ban on large gatherings, along with the closure of schools and nonessential businesses. Two days later, the Presbyterian Church of East Africa (PCEA) held a press conference to announce the closure of its worship services in adherence with the government directive. Even as the PCEA leadership discussed the closing of in-person worship services, we recognised the human impact of the government directives. Clearly for many of our people, if they don't work today, they won't eat tomorrow. In a country with nearly 65% of its people working in the informal labour sector, the same directives intended to keep people safe would lead to food insecurity. People around the country could be heard saying they would rather risk COVID-19 than hunger. When people are hungry, it's not about giving them bread for It is about walking with them one day. throughout their period of need whereby you will be able to testify to the goodness of the Lord when you see the daybreak together.

Within two weeks, we as the leaders of the PCEA had mobilised its 4.5 million church members to provide food and support for families. The "Adopt a Family" initiative fed more than 32,000 families throughout Kenya in April, May and June, and its efforts continue. Parishes and presbyteries have heeded God's command to love one another in times of joy and struggle. PCEA members and friends have shown up with bags of maize and flour, vegetables and milk, tea leaves and sugar, and financial support to purchase essential items. In collaboration with local congregations and community administrative officials, the PCEA has identified the most at-risk families and is walking with these families by providing a monthly delivery that provides enough food to sustain a family of four. The church hopes to continue the monthly drop-offs until the pandemic is over. Some of the members who are donating also are struggling financially themselves during this time. These faithful members have committed to giving 50 Kenya shillings a week (around 37p) and they have been donating each week for the past eight weeks. We also have some rural congregations who could not donate money. One such congregation from Nyahururu, a fertile part of the country, sent an entire truckload of maize that they recently harvested for families in the informal settlements of Nairobi. It is one of the great blessings of the Church: caring for one another in Christ.

Christian Aid: Lebanon Crisis

On 4th August a sudden explosion tore through the port of Beirut, Lebanon as the shock wave raced through densely populated areas. Nearly 150 people have lost their lives and more than 5,000 people have been injured. More than 750,000 people have been affected by this terrible disaster which has left families out on the streets with no food, shelter or emergency medical care. Across the city of Beirut, neighbourhoods were reduced to rubble by the blast, along with hospitals and crucial stores containing around 85% of the country's grain and medical supplies.

Homes and businesses have been flattened to the ground, windows shattered, and doors knocked down. Approximately 300,000 people are now homeless. Please help those who have lost everything. As the country sinks further into severe economic collapse, half the population already face starvation, unable to access basic goods including medicine. livelihoods seen their Thousands have disappear. This explosion has made a most dire situation worse. Our local partners Basmeh & and Mouvement are Zeitooneh Social responding in the most affected areas and reaching those who were already vulnerable. Together we are:

•Distributing food, water, hygiene and disinfection materials as well as clothes, mattresses, and blankets.

•Helping affected households to access medicine and health services.

•Mobilising volunteers to remove rubble in the places most damaged by the explosion.

•Referring families to temporary shelters and providing minor repairs for homes including carpentry and electrical fixes. If you would like to donate to the crisis appeal you can do so at christianaid.org.uk *Christian Aid Team*
