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from the Manse -

Dear Friends,

It has been quite a summer in many ways reminding me of those wise words of Scotland's own bard - "the best laid schemes o' mice an' men gang aft agley". We might make plans, looking forward to the time when they are realised, only to be taken by surprise by the unexpected. It can be a welcome turn of events, but it can also be one that we would rather have avoided for a whole number of reasons. Yet, we can learn from even the most difficult of situations and grow stronger through the most challenging of events. This might seem a bit of a cliche, but recent circumstances have brought this to life for me.

I often turn to Paul at the beginning of Philippians when I, in his words, give thanks "because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now". These words, each and every time I use them, I do so not only with a deep sense of gratitude but also sincerity. Last year's Stewardship Program "Alive and Giving" was an opportunity to celebrate the partnership we share within our fellowship which is the family Christ has brought us together in, as he has bound us together in love and by his Holy Spirit. It was also an opportunity to encourage a greater sharing in the worship, work and witness of the New Wellwynd, an encouragement that will continue in this next session as the Kirk Session continues to see how many more of you might be involved in what is happening and as we all have an opportunity to look to what is an exciting set of plans for the next five years. These plans look at what it truly means to be the church Christ has called us to be a part of, from how we nurture and support each other, right through to how we reach out and welcome in.

The invitation to Holy Communion, which you would have received in August, depicts the Last Supper with Jesus and his disciples gathered around a shared meal of remembrance and thanksgiving. This picture came from a postcard which I found in a little shop in Salamanca when I was on retreat there a few years ago. What jumped out at me was the depiction of the disciple next to Jesus leaning his head on his Lord's shoulder. This was an awakening for me who, like many, can be too proud to seek help or even acknowledge a need, something I might be struggling with physically, emotionally, mentally, spiritually. It was a lesson for me on the importance of times in my life, in all of our lives, of learning to lean on God and lean on each other. This can often be seen as a weakness in the eyes of the world, yet, acknowledging that we are truly struggling, takes great courage, especially when shared with another as we learn to trust and open up.

The BBC news recently highlighted the issue of men not going to see a GP when they noticed a problem with their health, problems that could be dealt with successfully if diagnosed early enough. Given the results of what surgeons removed from me, I count myself as fortunate for going early on. Be it something

medical, emotional or even spiritual, we need to let go of our inherent pride and let God take control. We need to reach out to others, be it our friends, family and professionals. And we need to do it when we realise that there is a problem.

Partnership in the Gospel is not just a sharing in the work because in its broadest sense it is about being there with each other and for each other. I have always tried my utmost to be there for you, but know that I am far from perfect, and I thank God that especially this summer you have been there for me.

Harvest Arrangements

As is the custom, flowers will be collected for the Harvest Service to be distributed to members who are housebound, in homes or are ill at this time. The halls will be open on Saturday, 6th October between 10 a.m. till 12 noon to collect your donations of flowers.

The minister will also be available to receive monetary donations towards a very worthwhile cause -

"Mercy Ships".

Mercy Ships is a faith-based international development organisation which deploys hospital ships to some of the poorest countries in the world, delivering vital, free healthcare to people in desperate need.

Conditions requiring surgical treatment kill more people in low-income countries than HIV/Aids, TB and malaria combined. Globally, five billion people have no access to safe, affordable surgery when they need it.

In sub-Saharan Africa, up to 69% of people live on less than £2 a day. Healthcare in these countries either doesn't exist or is unaffordable to the vast majority of the population.

As well as completing thousands of urgent operations onboard its "floating hospital", the Africa Mercy, Mercy Ships volunteers also work closely with host nations to improve the way healthcare is delivered across the country, by training and mentoring local medical staff, and renovating hospitals and clinics.

Founded in 1978 by Don and Deyon Stephens, Mercy Ships has worked in more than 70 countries, providing services valued at more than £1 billion. By improving healthcare delivery in every country it visits, Mercy Ships is working to eradicate the diseases of poverty and effectively do itself out of a job. Mercy Ships follows the 2,000-year-old model of Jesus by "bringing hope and healing to the forgotten poor", helping people of all faiths and none.

Among the countries Mercy Ships serves, which lie on the lower third of the World Health Organisation's Human Development Index, access to safe, affordable and timely surgery is extremely limited. As a result, countless people suffer and die from "diseases of poverty" that can easily be cured.
