from the Manse -

Dear Friends,

I was at a meeting recently which opened with an "icebreaker". We had to say who we were, where we were from and finish off by telling the assembled group something quirky about ourselves. The latter was something a number found difficult. Fortunately a number of folk spoke before me which gave me time to think of something quirky. I told them about my recent attempts at reupholstery. Yes, reupholstery!!!

I started with a piano stool and moved onto the nursing chair my parents got in a wedding present. The latest project which took over a year to complete was my grandfather's Parker Knoll rocking chair, which was a bit more challenging, especially given that I have had no training in this particular skill. So, how did I manage? I carefully removed all of the material and used it as the templates for the new material. The different pieces gave me a pattern to follow to complete the project.

When we piece together in our minds a picture of the church, not as it is, but as God desires it to be, what do we see? At University we read a book in Systematic Theology, a book by Avery Dulles called "Models of the Church" which gives, as the title says, models of what the church can be like. The model that strikes me is the one we find in the early church as described in the early part of the Book of Acts. And when we take time to look at it we can see different layers giving us a pattern for who we are and what we do.

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

The overall pattern is of a community who were as one - in worship as they gathered around the Word of God, friendship as they spent time together, eating together, sharing what they had especially with those in need. They were together as one in the temple courts as well as each other's homes. Basically the pattern is of unity, of learning, sharing and caring both in church, at home and in the community. These are part of our forward plan as we are challenged by the pattern that attracted many

into the early church. It is an encouragement to continue to develop this pattern and live this pattern as a community of faith who are there for each other and there for the community we seek to serve. Bonhoeffer expresses the challenge to the church in these terms -

"The more genuine and the deeper our community becomes, the more will everything else between us recede, the more clearly and purely will Jesus Christ and his work become the one and only thing that is vital between us. We have one another only through Christ, but through Christ we do have one another, wholly, and for all eternity."

May God draw us closer and closer to him in devotion and closer and closer to each other in love.
